The meeting was called to order at 11:30 am.

- 6. FY 2016/17 Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) and Budget Amendments: Review and consideration of amendments to the UPWP and budget for FY 2016/17.

Mr. Buchwald provided a Financial Summary that included historical budgets and expenses back to FY 2013/14; the adopted, revised, and proposed amended budgets for FY 2016/17; and the actual and projected expenses for FY 2016/17. He indicated that the Revised FY 2016/17 Budget does not include \$65,000 of funding from a Safe Routes to Schools Non-Infrastructure Grant that the TPO did not receive this fiscal year due to a change in the grant program by the Florida Department of the Transportation (FDOT). He identified that in addition to the loss of revenue from the TPO not receiving the grant funding, several unanticipated expenses contributed to the expenses exceeding the budget for FY 2016/17. He proposed that \$35,000 be allocated from the TPO's Available PL Funds of \$110,151 to balance the FY 2016/17 Budget.

Mr. Buchwald indicated that the proposed Amended FY 2016/17 Budget reflects the addition of the \$35,000 from the TPO's Available PL Funds. He also indicated that the proposed UPWP amendments reflect the addition of the \$35,000 from the TPO's Available PL Funds, the Amended FY 2016/17 Budget, and the rebalancing of funding in several tasks. Finally, Mr. Buchwald requested that the Executive Committee form a recommendation regarding the proposed UPWP and budget amendments for FY 2016/17. The discussion by the Executive Committee included confirmation of a surplus of PL funds of approximately \$110,000, the starting date of the fiscal year for the TPO, the projected continuing increases in health care expenses for FY 2017/18, and the amounts of State and Federal funding that the TPO may expect to receive in FY 2017/18.

The Executive Committee discussed Congressman Brian Mast's understanding of local transportation and health issues, the recent newspaper article regarding traffic safety on U.S. Highway 1, and the timeframe for the appointment of a new FDOT Secretary by the Governor.

#### BACKGROUND

The St. Lucie TPO typically reviews the performance of its Executive Director after the conclusion of each fiscal year. The TPO Executive Director most recently received a performance review in August 2017 after the conclusion of FY 2016/17 resulting in an average evaluation score of 18 out of a maximum of 24 points.

As FY 2017/18 has recently concluded, a review of the Executive Director's performance for FY 2017/18 is being initiated. The attached form was forwarded to all of the TPO Board Members for their completion. It will be used to evaluate the performance of the Executive Director by reviewing the skills and abilities that appear to be desired of the Executive Director by the TPO Board.

#### <u>ANALYSI S</u>

It is anticipated for the forms to be received and the results to be tabulated in time for the Executive Committee Meeting scheduled on July 25th. In addition to reviewing the results, it may be appropriate for the Executive Committee to discuss any salary adjustment and form a recommendation to the TPO Board based on the results of the Performance Review. Because the Executive Director's Employment Agreement expires on April 30, 2019, it also may be appropriate for the Executive Committee to initiate a discussion and form a recommendation to the Board regarding its extension.

SUBJECT: Staff Performance Bonus Program and Cost of Living Adjustment

#### BACKGROUND

In October 2013, the TPO Board adopted a performance bonus program to recognize past performance and encourage continued high performance of TPO staff members. The Staff Performance Bonus Program consists of a review of the staff member's performance annually by the TPO Executive Director after the completion of the TPO's fiscal year. The evaluation includes a review of qualitative and quantitative performance elements of the staff member's overall contributions toward the completion of the Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) end products and projects and toward the TPO implementing its planning priorities. The evaluation results in an overall performance score for the staff member for the previous fiscal year ranging from zero to two.

As part of the Staff Performance Bonus Program, after each fiscal year, the TPO Board approves a multiplier based on the performance of the organization in the previous fiscal year and the budget for the current fiscal year. The multiplier is applied to the staff member's overall performance score to determine the percentage of any performance-based salary increase for the staff member.

Since the adoption of the Staff Performance Bonus Program, the Board has annually approved salary increases consisting of the performance increases and various Cost of Living Adjustments. The most recent salary increases for the staff approved by the Board in August 2017 consisted of a performance multiplier of 1.0 with no cost of living adjustment due to budget constraints caused by the significant increases in employee health care expenses over the past several years and reduced revenue from the TPO not receiving a grant. This resulted in a maximum salary increase for a staff member of two percent for FY 2017/18.

#### <u>ANALYSIS</u>

During FY 2017/18, the TPO Staff continued to significantly contribute toward the completion of a considerable volume and wide range of UPWP end products and projects and toward the TPO implementing its planning priorities. At the April meeting, the TPO Board adopted the attached two-year budget for FY 2018/19 - FY 2019/20 that includes a 6.4 percent total increase in staff salaries for FY 2018/19.

The current U.S. annual inflation rate is approximately 2.1 percent. Therefore, a 2 percent cost of living adjustment and a 2.0 performance multiplier as part of the Staff Performance Bonus Program are proposed for 2018. This would result in salary increases ranging from 2 to 6 percent for staff, and the overall increase in staff salaries will not exceed \$23,000 in cost for the fiscal year.

These potential salary increases would not be applied to the TPO Executive Director as salary increases for the TPO Executive Director are approved separately by the TPO Board in accordance with the Employment Agreement.

#### RECOMMENDATION

Based on the performance of the TPO Staff for FY 2017/18, the current U.S. annual inflation rate, and the adopted budget for FY 2018/19, it is recommended that a 2 percent Cost of Living Adjustment and a multiplier of 2.0 for the Staff Performance Bonus Program be approved for 2018.

SUBJECT: Local Incentive Program for Project Advancement (LIPPA)

#### BACKGROUND

At prior TPO Board meetings, Board members requested that the Board consider the recognition of TPO Priority Projects which received local funding or are removed from the TPO's List of Priority Projects (LOPP) because the projects have been funded completely by the local agencies.

Because the allocation of local funding to TPO Priority Projects advances the construction of TPO Priority Projects and allows the TPO's funding to be used for additional Priority Projects, it appears to be appropriate to recognize and incentivize the allocation of local funding to TPO Priority Projects. Therefore, the LIPPA is proposed to recognize the allocation of local funding and advance the construction of more TPO Priority Projects through incentives.

An update on the development of the LIPPA is being presented to the TPO Executive Committee for informational purposes and to provide the opportunity for Staff to receive initial comments.

### <u>ANALYSI S</u>

The proposed LIPPA would serve as an overlay to the various project prioritization methodologies employed during the annual development of the LOPP. A new column identified as "Local Funding Credits (LFCs)" is proposed to be added to each of the lists of the LOPP. Local funding allocated to a project in the LOPP will be denoted in the LFCs column. The corresponding recognition and incentive awarded by the LFC will vary according to the list.

For the projects in the Master List, it is proposed for the LIPPA to recognize and incentivize local funding contributed to projects in the list. One LFC will be awarded for every dollar of local funding allocated, as identified in the TPO's Transportation Improvement Program, to a project in this list. The projects will be reprioritized annually based on the quantity of LFCs awarded from highest quantity to lowest quantity. If there are ties in the number of LFCs among two or more projects, the order among those projects would remain the same as the previous year. Actual examples of the Master List before and after the application of the LIPPA are attached.

Because the projects in the Congestion Management Process (CMP) and Transportation Alternatives (TA) Lists are much less costly than the projects in the Master List, it is more likely for these projects to be fully funded by a local agency. Therefore, it is proposed for the LIPPA to recognize and incentivize those projects that are fully funded by a local agency. If a project in either one of these lists is fully funded by a local agency, the local agency will be awarded one LFC for every dollar of that project cost, and accordingly, that project will be removed from the list. The local agency then will be provided the opportunity to select another project from the list, the project cost of which is equal to or less than the quantity of LFCs awarded to the local agency, and the selected project will be advanced to the top of the list. If there are multiple projects with LFCs in the list, the projects will be ranked starting at the top of the list based on the quantity of LFCs awarded from highest quantity to lowest quantity. Hypothetical examples of the CMP and TA Lists before and after the application of the LIPPA are attached.

Because the projects in the Transit List are funded wholly or in part by the Transit Municipal Service Taxing Unit (MSTU), which is supported by every property owner in St. Lucie County, it is proposed for the LIPPA to recognize and incentivize those projects that receive local funding other than the funding derived from the Transit MSTU. To incentivize greater local investment in the transit system, it is proposed that every dollar of local funding, other than that derived from the Transit MSTU, contributed by a local agency to a project in the list be awarded three LFCs that the local agency can apply to a project of their choice from the Master List. Hypothetical examples of the Transit and Master Lists before and after the application of the LIPPA are attached.

At its meeting on July 17th, the TPO Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) reviewed the proposed LIPPA and requested that the TAC be provided additional opportunity to review and provide comments prior to the consideration of the adoption of the LIPPA by the TPO Board. The comments provided by the TAC included the suggestions of applying LIPPA only to the

TA List or revising the TA Project Prioritization Methodology to award points for the allocation of local funding to a project.

#### RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the proposed LIPPA be reviewed and comments be provided to Staff.
